Notes:

* Artillery Group Transport: This is the rear-area transport that carries reserve ammunition, rations, and other supplies. It also includes the Quartermaster transport that will tow the mobile kitchens, laundries, and other equipment.

The Artillery Regiment was named after the Division (e.g. the IV Division had the IV Artillery Regiment), and the "Groups" (Battalions) were usually designated a, b, and g (Alpha, Beta, Gamma) e.g. XIIIb is the second 75mm Group of the XIII Artillery Regiment.

Ammunition:

The Regiment carried the following ammunition; 75mm Howitzer: 3072 Rounds (or 192 Rounds per Gun), 105mm Howitzer: 800 Rounds (or 100 Rounds per Gun).

Additional Notes:

In theory Regiments in Divisions that had previously been classified as "Infantry" had 75mm Field Guns (of various types) instead of Howitzers. In some cases, due to shortages, all 3 Groups had these (i.e. some of the later units did not get any 105mm Howitzers).

Several Divisions had only 2 groups of guns due to shortages, these usually both being 75mm in most cases.

About 70% of all the Greek Artillery (ignoring Infantry Guns) was 75mm calibre or similar, the balance mostly 85mm & 105mm, with only a handful of 150mm-155mm armed units.

Artillery units raised after the 28 October 1940 tended to have foreign equipment, either Italian weapons captured in Albania; Italian, French or British weapons mainly supplied from the British in the Middle East; or older odd Czech or Austrian (Skoda, etc) weapons from WWI.
